GEORGE , black, aged 11 years, a very likely house or doctor's boy; an orphan, fully guaranteed.	WILLIAM , mulatto, aged 25 years, good carriage driver and ostler, cook and general laborer, creole of this city; fully guaranteed
BETSEY , black, aged 13, good house girl, fully guaranteed	HILBY , mulatto, first rate carpenter, likely and fully guaranteed.
NICK , brown, aged about 7, also an orphan, both fully guaranteed.	MARY JANE , black, aged 24 years, good field hand and fair cook, fully guaranteed.
